Veterans Day Program

The 2015 Veterans Day Program at Chattanooga National Cemetery will be held Wednesday, 11 November, beginning at 11:00 am. The program will deviate slightly from previous years. This being the 50th anniversary of the beginning of the war in Vietnam, a special tribute will offer recognition to ALL Vietnam-Era Veterans (combat vets and non-combat) who served during the Vietnam War years. The Alhambra Shrine will provide bagpipe music featuring the Highlander Pipes & Drums and the Choo Choo Chorus will sing traditional songs and medleys. Jesse "Bud" Alley, Vietnam veteran and Silver Star recipient, will be the Keynote Speaker.

One major change is the "Massing of Colors" has been removed to keep the program inside the allotted time-frame. Units are invited to pre-post their flags to the left and right of the pavilion before the program begins. Flag-bearers are asked to arrive before 10:30 to post their unit flags.

FIFTY YEARS AGO IN **VIETNAM – OCTOBER 1965**

October 1965 brought the delayed start of the monsoon season to Vietnam. Rains normally start in late August or early September but this was the first experienced by the many units that had moved in during 1965. That October the rains in I Corps averaged over one inch per day. In the main bases and remote fire bases men were mostly in tents and/or bunkers which were erected in cleared areas. Everything and everybody was wet to the

bone. The roads had been made of compacted laterite, a local soil which, when dry, could be compacted into a hard surface but when wet became a soupy, sloppy mud. Camps and roads were a mess, supply areas flooded, and heavy vehicles were constantly stuck in the mud.

This weather slowed ground combat operations but the air war was kicking into high gear with bombing in North Vietnam and on the supply routes through Laos. At the start of 1965 there were only three airfield in the south capable of handling jet aircraft and parking ramps limited the number of squadrons that could be

accommodated. During the year these three, Da Nang, Bien Hoa and Tan Son Nhut had major expansions started using civilian contractors of the RMK-BRJ combine. A fourth expeditionary airfield for Marine Aviation units involved in close ground support operations was constructed at Chu Lai by Seabees of NMCB-10. A helicopter base was built at the foot of Marble Mountain near De Nang.

Naval aviation units of Task Force 77 comprising three carriers in the South China Sea were heavily attacking in North Vietnam. In late summer the North Vietnamese introduced a new Russian highly mobile missile system known as the SAM. The Navy and Air Force began to lose planes to the SAMs and they began trying to find and attack the illusive missile batteries. It wasn't until

October 17th that a flight of four A-4E's from the Independence was successful in destroying the first occupied SAM site.

Late in the month, under cover of the monsoon rains the enemy began coordinated attacks. The 1st Air Cav got its baptism of fire on the night of October 19th and its first encounter with North Vietnamese Army Regulars when the NVA attacked a Special Forces base at Pleime in the Central Highlands. The Air Cav responded and battled

> the NVA for the next week. Meanwhile on the coast there were three coordinated attacks during the night of October 27th on the airfields at Da Nang, Marble Mountain, and Chu Lai by suicidal Sapper Battalions. Most of the attacking forces were repelled but at Marble Mountain one unit got through the lines and destroyed over twenty aircraft with satchel charges. At Chi Lai two aircraft were destroyed and dozens

damaged.

Private First Class Milton Lee Olive, III, from Chicago IL who was a member of the 2nd Platoon, Company B, 2nd Battalion, 173rd Infantry Brigade was awarded the

Medal of Honor posthumously for action on October 22nd while on patrol near Phu Cuong. When pursuing the enemy through thick jungle, an enemy grenade was thrown into their midst. PFC Olive grabbed the grenade and smothered it with his body thus saving the lives of his fellow soldiers.

Veterans Bridge Flag Initiative

For many years, flags have been flown proudly on Chattanooga's Veterans Bridge in honor of the men and women who served in our nation's armed forces. In response to numerous requests from the citizens of Chattanooga, the City has created a program through which individuals may honor veterans by purchasing flags in their names. A \$75 donation will provide a flag which will fly on the Veterans Bridge and a mayoral proclamation recognizing the honoree's dedicated service.

- Each pole will have an assigned, unique number so that donors, friends, and family members will be able to identify which flag has been donated on behalf of the honoree.
- One Mayoral proclamation per flag will be created. The proclamation may honor an individual, family or organization.
- The flag will fly for 6 months or until such time as weather damage requires its replacement, whichever comes first
- Checks or money orders for \$75 per flag payable to the City of Chattanooga mailed to Chattanooga Department of Transportation, Flag Initiative, 1250 Market St, Suite 3030, Chattanooga, TN 37402.
- Once removed, the flag can be provided to the donor, if desired, or will be donated to the Boy Scouts of America.
 Flags must be picked up within 30 days from the VBFI Coordinator in Suite 3030 in the Development Resource
 Center at 1250 Market Street.
- Due to the limited number of poles, flags will be displayed on a first come, first served basis. Because of the strong response we have received for donations this year, it may be up to a year or possibly longer before the flag you donated is raised on the bridge. In all cases we will send you a notice and, if requested, the proclamation when the flag is raised.

Command of the US Naval Reserve Center in Chattanooga, Tennessee.; and

Whereas: John Doe's legacy of integrity in business, service to his country and community and his love for God, his church

and his family lives on.
